Introduction

Our free Friday lunchtime concerts at Bishopsgate Institute are back. Join us to hear pianist Maya-Leigh Rosenwasser as she explores themes raised by our LGBTQ+ collections.

Follow us on a journey through nine concerts taking in a range of musical genres, from the traditional to the unexpected. Over the course of the series, you will hear three groups of instruments - strings, percussion and electronics - presented and combined in different ways. Every week we ask our performers to respond to a theme suggested by the collections in our world famous Library and curate their programme around it.

From the suffragettes movement to LGBTQ+ activism, many of our radical archive collections include one or more items that remind us of the connection between protest and song. It is informed by a selection of late-twentieth-century lyrics, song books, sheet music, compositions, and original vinyl from our archives, including the records of activist singing group the Pre-Madonnas.

Meet the artist



Maya-Leigh Rosenwasser is a performer, improviser and composer, specialising in performing and composing new works for piano (solo and chamber), live electronics and multi-disciplinary ensembles. She has participated in numerous venues and events across Europe such as Greyfriarks Kirk (Edinburgh), Royal Conservatoire of Scotland's Piano Festival 2016-2018, soloist with St Bartholomew's Chamber Orchestra (London), Tanthem Live (immersive & improvised theatre, London), solo performance to the ambassador of the EU (Brussels), Bozsok Music Festival (Budapest) and in the Steinway Gallery (Cyprus) where she was also featured on national radio. Maya-Leigh is one of the founding members of Equinox & THIS THUS, two multi-disciplinary improvisational ensembles, and New Woods Collective, a wind trio specialising in specially commissioned repertoire for bass Clarinet, flute/piccolo, piano and electronics.

History of the lunchtime concerts

Our concerts have been a tradition since the Second World War, when Dame Myra Hess instigated them at the National Gallery to bring people together at a time of hardship.

Lunchtime Concerts began at the Institute in 1948 and Dame Myra's Steinway piano now lives at the Institute and is often played at our concerts. This is our first summer season, building on the success of our regular autumn and spring programmes.
